Grace to you and Peace in the name of Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. We are entering, for me, one of the most interesting and special times in the church

calendar. We are leaving the season of Easter – when we celebrate and remember that Jesus rose from the dead, and we are entering the season of ordinary time, but it is anything but ordinary.

We are about to, once again, witness and experience the power and might of Pentecost, where we will witness the power and majesty of the Holy Spirit and what can happen when we are filled with the spirit, and hopefully the fire will grow in us and lead us to change how we do things and how we look at things.

As the season of Easter comes to its close, Jesus' final word to his disciples is a prayer for unity. I cannot imagine anything more needed today, in the church, the nation, and the world. Division faces us everywhere; it seems to deepen by the day. We seem hellbent on separating ourselves from the "other," dwelling rabidly and proudly in our differences of tribe, race, political viewpoint, economic class, national identity or, perhaps most tragically, faith. Who is the "true" Christian? Who understands and follows Jesus "rightly"?

The unity for which Jesus prays could not be deeper or more intimate. He prays that we may be one even as he and God are one. "As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The

glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one as we are one" (vv. 21-22). In this prayer to his Father, Jesus brings us into the very heart of the Trinity. He prays that we may indwell with God Godself, even as Jesus so indwells.

This "ordinary time" is a time for change as we see the world changing before our very eyes. This time is the time for growing – the crops are all in full swing and growing, and we, hopefully, embrace God's plan for our lives and we are busy sharing this Good News with the world.

Unfortunately, Society is not the Society that most of us were born into. When we were growing up, God was a major part of our lives and our world. We prayed in school and Sunday found the majority of people in Church. Today, so much has changed – and not for the better, as God has been relegated to the background and the fundamentals on which this nation were founded are muted and almost non-existent.

For this unity to be restored, change must be experienced. Now the majority of Society are not in church, in fact the majority do not even have a relationship with God, therefore, changing the world is an even bigger task which will require us to change as well. We must do more than acknowledge that we are guilty of this or that. If we are to change the world, we must be willing to change ourselves.

Then with that change, we must act on what God has convicted us and demonstrate for the world a new and improved way of loving our neighbor. One that includes changing ourselves so we can change the way the world experiences life. This intimate relationship, this deep unity, is who God is — a God of relationship. We are inextricably and lovingly bound into God through Jesus, while we are also inextricably and lovingly bound to one another. In John, the oneness of the Father and Jesus is synonymous with love. Or in another way, I would say, the meaning of the Trinity is that we dwell innately in the heart of God where Jesus also dwells. In this same way, Jesus says, we dwell in each other.

Then perhaps, if we do our job well enough and with enough faith, then as we tell the world about the reality of this amazing Grace we have been provided, perhaps those we have, or will witness to, might see Jesus in our actions just as we see Jesus in the actions of the Apostle Paul who saved a family by not escaping. Then, just as the church began with the first Pentecost, then this Pentecost can be the beginning of how Society views the Church today.

Embrace the change and watch the world bloom in faith and unity.

The country featured this month is Laos which is #26 on the World-Wide List of Persecuted Christians. While there are only 203,000 Christians in Laos out of a population of 7,262,000, their numbers have been growing. The main religion is Buddhism, but the threats to Christians come from the Communist government who declare that worshipping in a home church is an "illegal gathering". Therefore, those found worshipping are arrested.

The good news is that 250 believers in Laos received their first Bibles, something they never thought would happen. Imagine trying to keep your faith alive in secret with no church and no Bible! Please pray that Christians imprisoned in Laos will be strengthened in body, mind and spirit. Pray also for house churches and pastors. Ask God to hide them from surveillance, attack and detainment and embolden them as His faithful witnesses. Thank you.

Director Lottie McKorkle is spending between \$500.00 and \$600.00 per month at HEB for meat. If monthly donations fall short, Lottie has to use funds reserved for emergencies to purchase additional groceries.

When the pandemic was at its height, the client needs at LA Care were minimal and we did not need to supplement with our gifts. However, with needs in the community increasing and donations decreasing, it is time for us to consider giving once again to LA Care.

For your information, HEB donates all their leftover breads, bakery items and packaged produce to LA Care, but they do not give a discount on purchases. Needs for this month include Ramen, saltine crackers and cash to buy meats. Thank you for your continuing support.


